

CRANSTON SEEKS TO LOCK UP MORE DESERT

Recently I ran across an article in an exchange bulletin and thought every rock hound should be aware of it. Senator Cranston wrote a bill 3-2061, that was presented on Feb. 7, 1986 entitled THE CALIF. DESERT PROTECTION ACT OF 1986. Because this bill has the support of almost every environmental group, including the powerful Sierra Club, it has been predicted that without a united opposition it could be signed into law as early as 6 months from now. According to the Western Mining Council, if this bill becomes law, it will have the largest negative impact in California history. Many hundreds of rich mines and hot mining areas will be swept away (including rockhounding areas) into the National Park System where mining and rockhunting are not allowed.

The bill affects 9.4 million acres of Calif. Desert in Riverside, San Bernardino, Imperial, Inyo, and Mono Counties. S-2061. proposes:

1. Creates 81 "instant" wildernesses totaling 4.48 million acres... twice the 2.1 million under BLM NO ROCKHOUNDS...
2. Transfers the 1.5 million acre East Mojave Scenic Area from BLM to the Natl. Park Service with Park status, half of the huge area will become 'instant' wilderness. It includes the Granite, Providence, New York, Ivanpaw, Hackberry and Piute Mts.; Lanfair Valley, Devils playground, and Mojave Sink. In Park Stays, prospecting, rockhounding, mining, drilling are strictly forbidden. Wilderness status forbids roads and vehicles. •NO ROCKHOUNDING...
3. Death Valley, rich in mineral sources, would be elevated to Park Status. Its size would be enlarged from 2.1 million to 3.4 million acres with inclusion of BLM lands on the West and East. 94% would be existing and Instant Wilderness. NO ROCKHOUNDING....
4. Joshua Tree Nat]. Monument would be "elevated" to Park Status. It ~u Increase from 560,000 to 805,000 acres of BLM lands on the Southwest and Southeast. Half of added lands, 133,000 acres, would become 'instant" Wilderness, making Joshua Tree almost totally Wilderness. NO ROCKHOUNDING....
5. Transfers 20,000 acres of Last Chance Cyn. to Red. Rock State Parke NO ROCKHOUNDING.....

As bad as BLM's Calif. Desert Use Plan is for multi-recreation use of Public lands, Cranston's bill is devastatingly worse.

WRITE TO: Se~. Cranston, U.S. Senate, Washington, DC, 20510 and tell him politely how you feel about his bill S-2061

WRITE TO: Sen. Pete Wilson, U.S. Senate and say you expect him to oppose Cranston's bill 2-2061

WRITE TO: your member of the House of Reps, Wash..~ DC, 20006 and ask him to oppose Cranston's bill 2-2061

WRITE TO: President Reagan, White House, Wash. DC, 20006 and advise him that Cranston's Calif. Desert Protection Act of 1986 is not good for Calif. and to ignore the advice of William Penn Mott, Director of the National Park Service.....

DIGGING FOR FIRE OPAL IN VIRGIN VALLEY, NEVADA

A trip to the opal fields in Virgin Valley is indeed a wonderful way to spend a weekend, a week or even longer. There are some things that the traveler should know, however, to make it more fun. We have prepared this brochure to help you plan your trip.

It should be remembered that you are going into some fairly wild country. There are no gas stations around the next bend in the road, therefore you gas up in Cedarville, CA, or in Denio, NV, or in Lakeview, OR. It is always a good idea to carry some extra gas and water in country like this. There is good water, and lots of it in Virgin Valley at the CCC Camp. You can camp there in trailers, tents and etc., there are no motels in the Valley. The closest motel is in Denio. The Rainbow Ridge Mine is 35 miles from Denio, NV. Many people drive back and forth each day or if you wish to you can camp at the CCC Camp. This is just five miles from the Rainbow Ridge Mine. All of the highways, except the one coming in from Cedarville, CA are paved. Highway 140 is all paved from Winnemucca, NV to Lakeview, OR. The last seven and half miles after leaving 140 coming to the mine are not paved. This is gravel and dirt. All you have to do is take it slow and you can make it easily. We have had every type of car at the mine, but we suggest that if you are pulling a house trailer that you leave it at the CCC Camp. Signs are our to guide you the last seven and half miles.

Please study the map. Not all is to scale, but if you follow it, you will have no difficulty getting to Virgin Valley. The Valley is some 28 miles from Denio, NV. It is 95 miles from Lakeview, OR. Virgin Valley is in the Charles Sheldon Antelope Range, and no shooting is allowed. The CCC Camp is two and a half miles after turning off the main road (Highway 140). You can camp there. The Rainbow Ridge Mine is some five miles further South. Most people like to camp at the CCC Camp as there is water here and even a shower to clean off some of the dust.

We have only tailings digging. Tailings are the material that has been dug out to the mine in the past and put out in the dumps to dry out and break down the clods of clay that the opals come in. So long as there are clods of clay, there is a chance that there are opals in them. The rates for digging in the tailings are \$20.00 per day, no half day rates, but children 8 to 13 will be half price. (Everyone on the tailings must pay to be there.)

Late news: I talked to Mrs. Hodson today and she gave me an update. They have opened up the old Rainbow Ridge diggings and have increased the amount of material available for noodling many times over. Some large and valuable pieces have been found in these tailings. Most of the people who were there last year did very well and many returned to dig a second or third day. New tailings will be brought to the digging area every two days or so. D.P.

We can't say what you will find. Part is luck and part is how much time you care to put into combing or noodling the tailings. We do say that most people get more than their moneys worth. It should be remembered that you are looking for fire opal, a precious stone, and a little piece of this can be worth a lot of money. Opal is found in only a few places on this earth. It is highly prized by many people and is without a doubt the most beautiful of all gemstones. The Nevada opal is some of the finest, if not the very finest, to

be found on this earth. True, it has its cracking problems, but so does all opal no matter where it comes from. We sell most of our opal as specimens, but have cut many, many really fine gem stones. Some- selling for \$100 per carat and more.

The Rainbow Ridge Opal Mine will be open to the public from the Memorial Day weekend till the middle of October. WE ARE CLOSED WEDNESDAYS. This years dates are May 24 to October 15.

June is usually a cooler month than July, with some rainfall possible. July and August are the warmest months. September is good with sunny days. The nights are cool throughout the season. For tools you need a shovel, small sharp pick and gloves are a good idea.

We will be most happy to see you in Virgin Valley, and know that you will have the time of your life. Remember, we are closed Wednesdays, and you must be at Rainbow Ridge Nine before 10 AM.



MAP TO OPAL FIELDS

DRY COUNTRY, GOOD IDEA TO CARRY DRINKING WATER AND EXTRA GASOLINE

Coming into Virgin Valley from the Denio route you have black top roads all the way to the turn off to Virgin Valley. From the turn off to the Rainbow Ridge Nine is just 7½ miles of gravel road. Coming from Cedarville, CA you have gravel from the Nevada line to about 12 miles from the turn off to the mine. Route 140 thru to Lakeview, OR is blacktop. After turning off 140 into Virgin Valley you have gravel roads, but only 7½ miles and any car can travel them with moderate caution.
